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## Community, connection and safety

In "The Before Times", prior to the pandemic, I'm not sure I understood where my sense of safety came from. I knew that I was fortunate to live in a place of relative peace, where I have a loving family, wonderful friends, a good job, a good home, and an amazingly supportive community. When you have always felt relatively safe, you don't spend a lot of time thinking about where that safety comes from.

As I watched the world wheeze and rattle its way through the pandemic, I was shocked to see people whose lives looked so similar to my own slowly fall apart. I worried. If it could happen to them, couldn't it happen to me? I thought those things kept a person safe.

All around me, people were looking for a culprit, a boogeyman, someone to blame. I watched one vulnerable community after another bear the brunt of the world's anger and confusion. Where were the things that were supposed to keep all of us safe? That's when I realized where my safety really came from.

The ground doesn't always feel firm under my feet, but the connections I feel to the communities I belong to are where my sense of safety comes from. I know there is a place where we can share our stories, confess our fears, lift each other up, keep each other warm, learn from one another, and carry each other forward, even when the world is mired in uncertainty.

These past few years have been strange, but I know that the Teesri Duniya Theatre will continue to create community, foster connection, and hold a space where we can all feel safe.

### No One Is Safe If All Are Not

Meet Me, Tribes!, and a brand new production of Counter Offence in 2023 demonstrates Teesri's resolve that the cancellation of our plays and activities was never an option.

Since March 2020, when social distancing became the pandemic norm, Teesri Duniya Theatre has bridged the distance between wrong and right through its varied activities. While masks became a pandemic reality, we sought to unmask many problems that ail our world. Through our lockdown era, we celebrated the resilience of our unrecognized heroes; frontline workers, care providers, all individuals who sacrificed their safety so the rest of us could live safe and sound.

The pandemic's big lesson is that no one is safe if all are not – and that has been Teesri's guiding light throughout everything we have done.

While the lockdown challenged us to remain creative, meaningful, and relevant, it also revealed that the most fundamental contradictions of our world predate COVID-19 – that is a pandemic of poverty, violence, trafficking, missing and murdered Indigenous women, xenophobia, homophobia, transphobia, right-wing populism, wars and world hunger, to name a few.

Teesri Duniya Theatre has remained steadfast in telling unique stories of people that right the wrong. We continued addressing pressing issues before and during the pandemic by making space to share diverse voices and ideas from a progressive perspective.

Now that the pandemic is settling, we continue to decenter colonial spaces and disrupt colonial narratives, inviting audiences to see the world differently. With an ever-present consciousness towards decolonization, Teesri Duniya Theatre continues to tell stories that imagine positive change. Our plays combine artistic beauty with social relevance – we challenge and entertain simultaneously, creating opportunities for conversation to promote social justice, equality, and shared human dignity. We invite our audiences to see the world as it should have been. Beyond the pandemic, our journey remains the same – change the world one play at a time.

## **ENGAGEMENT**



Rana Bose lives on in our collective memory.

Our dear friend and comrade Rana Bose passed away on May 10th, 2023.



Rana wore many hats. He was a poet, playwright, novelist, artist, ideologue, scientist, engineer, co-founder of Teesri Duniya Theatre, founder of Montreal Serai, and an honest Marxist who fought for a world where people live in peace as equals. His writings, thinking, and actions pushed for progress through human dignity.

Rana dedicated his life to fighting crimes of capitalism, protesting the suppression of democracy, human rights, women's rights, and ultimately the right to dignity. He fiercely questioned ethno-majoritarianism and nationalism and attacked the rise of Hindu nationalism that is wrecking India. Rana never gave up his quest for truth and a socialist world vision. He inspired us to envision a world where people care for each other and himself launched a relentless fight against class oppressors.

Rana loved people. He loved his family, his extended family, children, and grandchildren, and they loved him. He left us today, but we must celebrate Rana's life, ideas, actions, and struggle for a better world.

Other production years include 1996 and 2020, the later of which was postponed twice due to Covid-19. This year, through much perseverance, the show finally got its chance to be produced.

Over 50 actors signed up for the auditions, making it one of the largest audition turnouts in Teesri's history!

# TRIBES! (NO MATTER WHAT)

June 8th - 18th 2023

Tribes! (No Matter What): theatre that makes you think. This piece, the final play by activist and writer Rana Bose, is an absurdist work that forces the audience to question everything and take nothing for granted. *Tribes!* (No Matter What) played at the MAI Theatre from June 8-18, with the entire process being completed in only a month and a half.

Though Rana could not be with us to celebrate his accomplishments, performer and director Howard Rosenstein made it all happen, doing whatever was necessary to ensure this production went forward. *Tribes! (No Matter What)* featured performances from fabulous local actors Sophie-Thérèse Stone-Richards and Simon Pelletier, and had a stellar creative team comprising of Kate Hagemeyer (stage management), Jon Cleveland (lighting design), Rob Denton (sound design), Barbara Rosenstein (poster design), and Anita Nittoly (fight direction).

All of the creative work was supported by the Teesri office team, including Sean Ryan, Prerna Nehta, Fred Blais, Brooklyn Melnyk and Artistic Director Rahul Varma. Audience turnout was high, and the reviews came in overwhelmingly positive- including a stellar review from Jim Burke. Many theatregoers highlighted the striking design elements and strong acting work, with numerous audience members commenting on how thrilled they were to be back in the theatre witnessing such a refreshing and stimulating performance!



# A NOTE FROM LISA FOSTER

Rana Bose was a playwright, novelist, poet, writer and professional engineer, born in Calcutta and long based in Montréal. He was one of the founding editors of the theatre group and magazine Montréal Serai, committed to magnifying the voices of "New Arts, New Communities" and bringing the margins to the centre. Activism was in his bones, and his extraordinary energy, wit and vision have helped sustain a far-reaching community based on solidarity and respect, shifting and decolonizing the cultural landscape. Rana had over 40 years of writing, theatre and production work on stage under his belt. He wrote and staged 11 plays, 10 of which have been performed in Montréal, New York, Vancouver, Toronto, Guelph, Chicago and India. Rana's theatre works and play scripts have been featured in several anthologies published in the U.S. and Canada, as well as being used for doctoral dissertations in literature and drama in Belgium, the U.S., Canada and India.

He directed plays by other playwrights as well, including Sue Townsend's The Great Celestial Cow (when he was co-founder of Teesri Duniya Theatre) at the Centaur Theatre in Montréal, and Sharon Pollack's, Komagata Maru Incident, performed in Montréal and Vancouver to mark the 75th anniversary of the arrival of the ship in Burrard Inlet. Rana also did theatre design and lighting

design for major shows in St. Louis and Montréal.

Many of the plays he wrote and directed were performed by Montréal Serai: Baba Jacques Das and Turmoil at Côte-des-Neiges Cemetery, On the Double, Some Dogs, Nobody Gets Laid, Five or six characters in search of Toronto, Black Skirt, The Death of Abbie Hoffman, and The Sulpician Escarpment. Rana authored four novels: Recovering Rude (Véhicule Press, 1996), The Fourth Canvas (Mawenzi House Publishers, 2008), Fog (Baraka Books, 2019) and Shaf and the Remington (Baraka Books, 2022). Fog won a Best Canadian Fiction award from the Miramichi Review. He wrote over 300 articles, reviews, short stories and critical essays that were published in various publications and broadcast and reviewed on the CBC, as well as in the Montreal Gazette, the Globe and Mail, Montréal Serai, Quill and Quire, The Montreal Review of Books and the Ottawa Citizen. In 2016, Rana was awarded the Quebec Writers' Federation Judy Mappin Community Award for his contributions to English literature in Quebec. He served on many Canada Council juries for grants to theatre groups and emerging writers.





# GO FISH!

On May 11th, 2023, Teesri Duniya Theatre hosted a staged reading of Carolyn Fe's new play, *Go Fish!* directed by Lib Spry as part of Accès Asie's Asian Heritage Month Festival. Originally developed as part of Teesri's 2022 Fireworks program, Carolyn wrote this work in part to ensure older women had access to acting opportunities and to allow them to see themselves being represented on the stage.

Featuring local actresses, Raissa Beaudoin, Nouella Grimes, Li Li, Bonnie Mak, and Linda Nourse, Fe tells the story of an older woman who becomes a witness to her past as she prepares to let go. Separating and compartmentalising all the women she had been with at different stages in her life as she lives out her last day on Earth.



# FIREWORKS PLAY DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

The Mentorship Program ran from November 15, 2022-May 1, 2023, with performance's being held live and in person in the Salle de Communaute at the CDH building May 13 and 14th.

Developed by Teesri Duniya Theatre, the Fireworks Playwrights' Development Program is a unique intercultural theatre artist development program focused on playwriting and culturally sensitive dramaturgy. Now in its ninth year of operation, the scope of this program has grown in its ability to support the featured artists and showcase their talent to a broader audience base.



Phase One featured a guided program where artists developed their skills as playwrights, broadened their ideas, and produced a workshop draft of a full play. They received group and one-on-one dramaturgy/ mentorship with established and celebrated dramaturgs Vishesh Abeyratne and Jen Cressey.

In the second phase of the program, artists with complete drafts worked with both emerging and professional practitioners (actors, directors, producers) to produce a publicly presented reading.

These public readings were delivered in person for the first time in 3 years, marking a triumphant return to Fireworks in person programming. In all, this program employed two (2) seasoned dramaturges, six (6) breakout playwrights, and nineteen (19) actors of diverse backgrounds.


# To Her Who Knocks by Trusha Chauhan

At her wit's end, Indy decides to get her hands on her grandfather's inheritance money as her way out of the house she feels trapped in. Indy discovers things are not what they seem as her search for independence begins to reveal secrets from Eve's past and that money may grant freedom but it cannot wash away the sins that bind a family. To Her Who Knocks is a contemplation on caregiving and highlights the dissatisfaction, resentment and guilt that hide beneath the surface of love. 

# ARTIST GATHERING FOR MAHSA AMINI





Mahsa Amini. A name. A woman. A movement. Since the 16th of September the name Mahsa Amini has ricocheted through the world illuminating the violence of the Islamic Republic's totalitarian regime. For Teesri Duniya Theatre, this has been a call to action.

Twenty-two years old Mahsa Amini was arrested by Iran's morality police, accused of wearing her hijab "improperly." After being severely beaten by the morality police she died in custody after three days. Iranian authorities insist Mahsa died from a stroke, which reminds us of the Iranian regime's denials of the deaths of Zahra Kazimi, Satar Beheshti, Zahra Bani Youghoubi and many more over the decades.

A global response is needed. Teesri Duniya Theatre joins those who are outraged at Mahsa's death and at the continued harassment and repression of women both in Iran and worldwide.

On October 28, 2022, we hosted an event to hear from Iranian Canadian artists, inviting a free exchange of thought.

Since April 2023, Teesri has been selling calendars whose contents present feminist poetry to resist oppression and demand freedom for all women. To date we have raised over \$400 which will be strategically donated to ensure access to Iranian women on the front lines.

# GLOBAL DIALOGUES

Led by board member, Cristina Alejandra Jiménez Gómez, Part One of the Global Dialogues project was aimed at creating space to discuss intersectional concerns within communities interested in meaningful discourses in order to generate alliances and take action.

Global Dialogues' challenge was to offer a platform to counter misinformation and provoke culturally inclusive conversations.

Global Dialogues was a community-based project developed in two cycles: Word Circles and Action Spirals. Both sessions were designed by applying ancestral technologies like orality, spiral thinking and participatory action research. These techniques served as vehicles to develop sessions which care for the cultural and human experience. Moreover, this project was intended to establish alternative spaces for Teesri Duniya's communities to gather and exchange.

The success of this project was only possible because of participants' openness, listening, and voice. It was nourishing to learn from their experiences, knowledge, and contributions. Projects like these provide communities with the opportunities to grow and to learn more about Teesri Duniya's Mission of changing the world one play at a time.

Part two of the Global Dialogues project - expected to be released by the next year, is a podcast series created to interchange ideas on local issues aligning with artistic and educational perspectives. We want to have thought-provoking conversations. We aim to open social dialogues, raising awareness and intersecting communities with inspiring processes and experiences of change.







On February 19, 2023, the Rang collective alongside Teesri Duniya Theatre, the Center for Study and Research in South Asia (CERAS), and Montreal Serai hosted a free screening of India: The Modi Question, a two-part BBC documentary that examines claims about Indian PM Narendra Modi's role in the 2002 riots that left over a thousand dead.

Presented as part of Screening South Asia, a series by the Rang Collective in Montreal, this series showcased work by filmmakers and artists- feature films, documentaries, short films, experimental films etc. emanating from South Asia and its diaspora.

The goal was to create dialogue and awareness around Social Justice issues for marginalized South Asian and South Asian-adjacent communities, primarily through cultural events, especially in Quebec- a goal which was achieved at this event.

The turn out was large, sporting approximately 50 audience members. Following the screening, a lively discussion was hosted by the Rang collective where Muslim and Hindu community members alongside others, were able to learn and debate together, sharing their perspective on the causality and consequences of the riots.

# BREAKING

June 2nd, 2023

Teesri Duniya Theatre in collaboration with McGill's office of Gender Equity and 2SLGBTQIA+ Education, Action Santé Travesti(e)s et Transexuel(le)s du Québec (ASTT(e)Q), Param Nrithyalaya Dance School, and AGIR Montréal (Action LGBTQIA+ avec les ImmigrantEs et RéfugiéEs), hosted Dr. Narthaki Nataraj where she spoke about her journey as a trans-woman and performed in the Indian classical dance form, Bharatanatyam.

Dr. Nataraj, a recipient of the Padmashri award, (one of the highest Indian civilian awards) for her work in the arts and her unwavering support of the LGBTQ+ community at home and abroad, led a lecture demonstration entitled "Breaking Barriers", instilling awe and unconditional love into all those who attended.

It was a full house that evening, with the nearly 70 audience members filling the Salle de Communaute. The introductions were given by Deeksha Arya (En) and Daphne Barile (FR). The event was moderated by Deeksha.


Dr. Nataraj spoke of the policies she is proposing to support the LGBTQ2S+ community in India, stating that governments still have much to learn and much to do to ensure equity. In a divine ending to the evening, Dr. Nataraj said that all she and Ms. Bhaskar want is a world not discriminated by identity, but rather where everyone is accepted and recognized for their merit - a world with "unconditional love".

The evening held many powerful moments, perhaps memorable was when Dr. Nataraj's inseparable trans sister, Ms. Sakthi Bhaskar, joined her on the stage, and Dr. Nataraj spoke of how Ms. Bhaskar, an equally adept Bharatanatyam artist and Tamil literature scholar, is her biggest supporter, taking on the role of Dr. Nataraj's manager and mentor, the pride shining brightly on both of their faces.

# Miss Portrayal of Asians Promotes Racism

Community Alliance (CA) is a project spearheaded by the Artistic Director (Rahul Varma) and managed by the Outreach Coordinator (Sean Ryan). Together they assembled a team of representatives to act as Teesri Duniya ambassadors. The team consisted of Ambica Sharma, Louna Fezoui, and Lisa-Willia Volcy.

The ambassadors' main goal was to establish, build, and maintain mutually beneficial (non-monetary) relationships between Teesri Duniya Theatre and the various community organizations they connected with. Our target organizations were to focus on providing services for or which promote BIPOC and LGBTQIA+ people, women's rights, social justice, and environmental issues.

The team created a list of Montreal based organizations to contact, then designed an email template to introduce Teesri Duniya – including our mission and mandate, and outlining the notions of the CA project. Alongside the email, the team drafted a script for in person and/or phone meetings, an informational pamphlet (print) and audio-visual slideshow providing details on the project and history on Teesri, as well as a print poster which was distributed to the organisations to be hung as promotional material for Teesri.

Our time was also spent deepening and reaffirming existing relationships. The majority of the Artistic Director's in-kind work was spent in consultation with various South Asian groups such as the Rang Collective, a Montreal based collective for the arts, and Bharat Bhavan, a foundation which provides social support to members of the South Asian diaspora.
